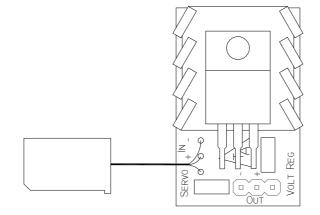

User's Guide

Introduction

The Thomson Automation Servo Voltage Regulator is designed for use with the Receiver Expander. It is connected between the servo channel output from the Receiver Expander and each servo. It is used with battery voltages above 6 Volts. Even though it is specially designed for use with the Receiver Expander, it can be used with other systems to stabilize the supply voltage to your servos as long as the signal level does not exceed the supply voltage.

Two models are available:

- 1. Regulated 5 volt power
- 2. Regulated 6 volt power

The Receiver Expander is intended for hobby use only. Thomson Automation is not responsible for any damage or injury that occurs through the use of this product.

Connecting the module

Simply plug the cable into the signal / power source and the servo into the regulator.

Heat Dissipation

Be sure to provide adequate cooling air flow around the module. Do not wrap the module in foam rubber as is normal for some module installations. Test you installation in operation for overheating. You should always be able to touch the heat sink while the module is in operation.
